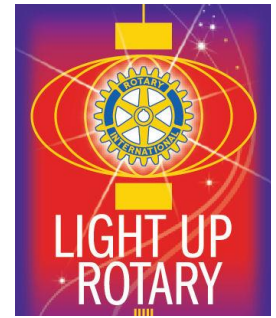

Lots of Updates on Club Projects

President Sue introduced her daughter **Heather**, recently visiting from college, who spoke on **kidCARE**. kidCARE was awarded a \$500 district 7150 Simplified Grant to expand its service area to include the Village of Dundee and the Dundee Central School students. Matching funds have been secured and Heather reported that they were acquiring the usual diapers, underwear, new and gently used clothes and shoes for preschoolers and elementary school kids in acute need. A needs assessment revealed that there is a need for a “clothes closet” early in the year. Many students arrive at school without proper clothing. Heather started kidCARE when she was in fifth grade with initial support from the Penn Yan Lions and Rotary Clubs. Kudos Kiddo!!!!

President Sue also announced that several agencies are cooperating with each other in a special push to get **winter coats** for kids and adults that were affected by the floods and just plain poverty. New and clean used coats can be dropped off at any of the local bank branches or Nothnagle Realty. **Act quickly....distribution date is October 31st.**

Ef A. has visited the Rotaract meeting a few times and has come to the conclusion that these students as far as vocational mentoring goes have grown up in a bubble. He sees a great role for our club members to play in sharing professional experiences and passions with the Rotaractors. He proposed that Rotarians share vocational/avocational interests with him, and he reduces it to an anonymous profile. When he has a book of profiles he can give it to the Rotaract Advisors. Then, when a student sees something of interest, the advisor arranges a mentoring moment. A great twist on the old Vocation and Career sharing. **Larry L.** reported that the students were hungry for the information that he and **Bob S.** shared on fundraising. **Mary Ellen M.** mentioned that the Rotaract Club is highly regarded on campus, probably because members get many opportunities to lead small teams and because they are learning skills that help them be successful in other organizations on campus.

Shelby McGlynn, Rotarian in the Canandaigua club visited and shared news about the Camp ONSEYAWA Staff Recognition and Appreciation Dinner on November 1st at FLCC. The attendance by paying Rotarians is wanted so that it offsets the free dinners for those being recognized/appreciated. Cash bar at 5, Dinner with wine at table at 6. Sarah C. pitched an Early Intervention program for literacy that focuses on pre-K and Kindergarten age children. Like the book parties that the club organized at the elementary school years ago, Sarah proposes a “Community Reading Night” of book reading, pizza, pajamas, celebrity readers and a book to take home. She is focused on the 139 kindergarteners in PYE for an event on November 5th. Watch and get involved.

Ryan H. reported on the Rotary Literacy Summit he attended. YC students start below level and progress appropriately every year. But, don’t catch up and skills erode over summer break. **Rob S.** and others talked about Family Literacy as a possible project.

(continued from page 1) **Evelyn E.**, a twenty year volunteer reader at the PY Public Library, passed on comments by **Millie Bloomquist**, former public health nurse, that nine out of ten homes she visited had NOTHING to read in the home. According to our **Literacy Chair Ryan**, representatives from Literacy Volunteers of Ontario and Yates have started organizing a Family Literacy program. Ryan also shared that Sebastian, one the Lost Boys from the Sudan will be speaking at the Middle School when the students finish reading "A Long Walk for Water." Watch for details. Club members will be involved in the event.

Don O. was the final speaker for the program and he shared how the club has assisted with poverty and local poor nutrition. Statistically, 22% of Yates Co. youth are "food insecure." Hanna's project that was supported by the District and the club last year was to create a cookbook for individuals that get free or local food donations. The recipes were tailored to the local conditions. He also shared a grant success story about an e-club project to promote youth literacy through a writing competition. Wonderful stuff..... Very inspiring

INTERESTING ROTARY FACTS

Another visiting DGE next January will be **G. Hidayat Tjokrodojo** from the Jakarta Metropolitan club. While he is visiting he will be hosted in the Corning area. District 3410 represents the western portion of Indonesia, primarily the major islands of Sumatra and Java (as we call them in English). The native language is Javanese and the dominant religion is Muslim. The Spice Islands were a colony of the Dutch until the end of WWII. The country consists of many

ethnic and linguistic minorities, with a national slogan of “many, yet one.”

Indonesia is the 4th largest nation in the world, with a population greater than 250 Million, yet it also boasts of the 2nd most diverse ecology in its many wild areas. There have been many periods of political unrest since independence was gained. Since 2005 there has been greater national stability and mostly pro-western political policies.



The District’s newsletters are in Indonesian, so it was hard to understand the hundreds of projects, until I came across a Literacy Project – Little Libraries. This common thread should make **Chris Wyant** and **Tom May** happy.
