

Larry Lehner Tells his Story

Larry L. came with his saxophone to the club a few years ago from Duluth, Minnesota. At the time, he was working with Keuka College and moving east to be closer to his daughter Christie and grandchildren. He became involved in the United Methodist Praise Band, and Murhy's Law, a classic rock band.

Larry was born in Columbus Ohio, raised in the poor rural area of Mt. Pleasant, OH, graduated in a class of 27 students and attended Ohio State University. As a scholarship recipient, he was housed in a men's dormitory under the bleachers of the great football stadium. (continued next page)



Larry graduated with a degree in marketing and a draft number of 5, during the later stages of the War in Viet Nam, so as a college grad promptly enrolled in Officer Candidate School. Dreading an Infantry assignment in the active war zone, he lucked out with a boring assignment in Korea. Married Diane between basic soldier training and OCS; then promptly went on an unaccompanied tour of 23 weeks.

Son Troy is in Colorado. Diane works for the ARC of Yates, and Larry is now working part-time with Bob and Jackie Shrader's Proforma. Larry joined Rotary in Superior where he worked with several Rotary Clubs in their annual Dragon Boat Festival. A big time fundraiser (\$92,000), similar to the Dragon Boat Festival hosted by the Asian Community in Ithaca.

Larry's careers were in Hospital Administration, and Fundraising for Hospitals and later, Keuka College. As COO and later consultant, he is most proud of his leadership in turning around some struggling hospitals. He is a Life Fellow in the American College of Healthcare Executives and a member of the Association for Fundraising Professionals.

A-B-Cs of Rotary

For years, many "Rotary Minutes" at our weekly meeting consisted of educational material from a little book called: "The ABCs of Rotary." Since we no longer do that, and many actively working members can attend only about 50% of the meetings, some new members feel a little adrift. At the request of a few newer members, the ABCs are going to be shown here. New members need mentoring. If you need a mentor ask your sponsor or president Stacy.

THE SPONSORSHIP OF A NEW MEMBER

The bylaws of Rotary clearly outline the procedure for a prospective member to be proposed for Rotary club membership. The "proposer" is the key person in the growth and advancement of Rotary. Without a sponsor, an individual will never have an opportunity to become a Rotarian. Individuals must be asked to join Rotary; thus, it is every member's responsibility to identify and invite prospective members.

The task of the sponsor should not end merely by submitting a name to the club secretary or membership committee. Rotary has not established formal responsibilities for sponsors; however, these procedures are common in many clubs.

The sponsor should:

1. Invite a prospective member to several meetings prior to proposing the individual for membership.
2. Accompany the prospective new member to one or more orientation/informational meetings.
3. Introduce the new member to other club members each week for the first month.
4. Encourage the new member to become involved in any club service projects underway.
5. Invite the new member to attend meetings of the Interact or Rotaract clubs sponsored by the club.
6. Provide opportunities for the new member to get involved in international program efforts, such as Group Study Exchange or Youth Exchange.

7. Invite the new member to accompany the sponsor to neighboring clubs for the first make-up meeting to learn the process and observe the spirit of friendship.

8. Ask the new member and spouse to accompany the sponsor to the club's social activities, dinners, or other special occasions.

9. Urge the new member and spouse to attend the district conference with the sponsor.

10. Serve as a special friend to assure that the new member becomes an active Rotarian.

When a new member becomes involved and connected, both Rotary and the new member become stronger. If you are a new member and feeling a little lost, contact a Board member and ask about an upcoming fireside chat opportunity. President **Stacy** says we need to plan one soon.

NOTE: If you have someone you wish to sponsor as a member, but cannot devote all this attention to their successful integration into the club, please speak to a Board member. They will help find a mentor, if they know that you need the assistance.
