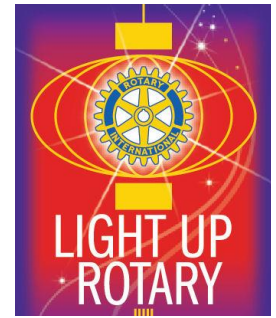

## Rocking and Rolling in the Club Assembly



**Past President Diane** shows the banner our Penn Yan Club earned in 2012-13 for generous support of the RI Foundation. A 100% of club members gave at least something to the Foundation, and the average per capita contribution was over \$100, or \$4,000 last year. The club is in the top 3.5% of clubs world-wide. Penn Yan was one of six clubs in the District that had 100% sustaining members, and many of the club members have chosen the Foundation as the charity of their choice at death by planning a substantial bequest from their estates. RI is grateful that **Dick B** made such a bequest several years ago.

**President Stacy** set a rapid pace trying to cover all the matters raised at the morning Board meeting. **Don O.** shared a great deal about the Foundation, most of which will be included in this and subsequent issues of the Newsletter. Those who attended the Foundation Brunch at the Belhurst Castle last Sunday were treated to a truly inspirational presentation by a former ('01) Ambassadorial Scholar, Melissa Pritchard, who studied in Barcelona, Spain. The experience completely changed her life and career, and she emigrated to Spain. After 12 years in Spain teaching English, she started a 14,000 mile bicycle trek across Europe and Asia to return home to Oregon.

The Board recommended to the club that we host the 2016 spring (late March or early April) **District Training Assembly** for then incoming District Governor **Tom Rogers**. After discussion, the club was asked for a vote of support. Since there were no objections, President Stacy will notify the district that we will be glad to host the Assembly. It will entail some concentrated efforts packing welcome packets, arranging for Audio Visual Support at the training site (Keuka College or the PY Academy), directing traffic to parking, and conducting registration. There are several very accomplished advisors to assist us.

All club members were reminded that they should visit the Board of Directors meetings if they can. They will learn how the club is governed and have a chance to speak up. The next meeting will be December 9<sup>th</sup> (2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday) at Lyons National Bank at 8 AM.

Regarding the Foundation, it was noted that it is one of the best-rated charities in the USA. It has one of the lowest administrative burdens, and for our interest, 50% of the money donated in the District comes back to local clubs two years later as District Simplified Grants. We have used those grants for many important projects in Penn Yan.

## A-B-Cs of Rotary

### INTERNATIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES OF A ROTARIAN

As an international organization, Rotary offers each member unique opportunities and responsibilities. Although each Rotarian has the first responsibility to uphold the obligations of citizenship of his or her own country, membership in Rotary enables Rotarians to take a somewhat different view of international affairs. In the early 1950s a Rotary philosophy was adopted to describe how a Rotarian may think on a global basis. Here is what it said: "A world-minded Rotarian:

- Looks beyond national patriotism and considers him/herself as sharing responsibility for the advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace.

- Resists any tendency to act in terms of national or racial superiority.
- Seeks and develops common grounds for agreement with peoples of other lands.
- Defends the rule of law and order to preserve the liberty of the individual so that he may enjoy freedom of thought, speech and assembly, and freedom from persecution, aggression, want and fear.
- Supports action directed toward improving standards of living for all peoples, realizing that poverty anywhere endangers prosperity everywhere.
- Upholds the principles of justice for mankind.
- Strives always to promote peace between nations and prepares to make personal sacrifices for that ideal.

- Urges and practices a spirit of understanding of every other man's beliefs as a step toward international goodwill, recognizing that there are certain basic moral and spiritual standards which will ensure a richer, fuller life."

That is quite an assignment for any Rotarian to practice in thoughts and actions!

## Our Rotary Foundation

The Rotary Foundation offers four specific funds (donor method) to which we can contribute. Each fund supports projects in one or more of Rotary International's six primary areas of focus. These funding approaches are:

Annual Programs Fund - Here a donor's unrestricted contributions support district and global grant activities. This fund is the primary source of unrestricted support for the programs provided through the Rotary Foundation in the six areas of focus. One-half of all Rotarian contributions to this fund are returned to their respective districts three years later for use on local or global grant projects at their discretion.

Polio Plus Fund - Here, donor's restricted contributions focused on worldwide projects to eradicate polio permanently.

Term Gifts - These restricted contributions are generally expended in the following year on a

specific global grant or for Rotary Peace Centers. Most members do not give in this category.

Permanent Fund - These restricted contributions are held in perpetuity as part of the Foundation's endowment fund. Spendable earnings supplement the Annual Programs Fund and also support Rotary's highest priorities, including Global Grants and Rotary Peace Centers.

The six areas of focus are as follows:

### **Promoting peace**

Today, 42 million people are displaced by armed conflict or persecution. Through our partnerships with several leading universities, Rotary Peace Fellows develop the skills to strengthen peace efforts, train local leaders to prevent and mediate conflict, and support long-term peace building in areas affected by conflict. We provide up to 100 peace fellowships per year at Rotary Peace Centers.

### **Fighting disease**

More than 100 million people are pushed into poverty each year because of medical costs. We aim to improve and expand access to low-cost and free health care in underdeveloped areas. Our members educate and mobilize communities to help prevent the spread of major diseases such as polio, HIV/AIDS, and malaria. Many of our projects ensure that medical training facilities are located where the workforce lives.

### **Providing clean water**

More than 2.5 billion people lack access to adequate sanitation facilities. At least 3,000 children die each day from diarrheal diseases caused by unsafe water. Our projects give communities the ability to develop and maintain sustainable water and sanitation systems and support studies related to water and sanitation.

### **Saving mothers and children**

At least 7 million children under the age of five die each year due to malnutrition, poor health care, and inadequate sanitation. To help reduce this rate, we provide immunizations and antibiotics to babies, improve access to essential medical services, and support trained health care providers for mothers and their children. Our projects ensure sustainability by empowering the local community to take ownership of health care training programs.

### **Supporting education**

Sixty-seven million children worldwide have no access to education and more than 775 million people over the age of 15 are illiterate. Our goal is to strengthen the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy, reduce gender disparity in education, and increase adult literacy.

### **Growing local economies**

Nearly 1.4 billion employed people live on less than \$1.25 a day. We carry out service projects that enhance economic and community development and develop opportunities for decent and productive work for young and old. We also help strengthen local entrepreneurs and community leaders, particularly women, in impoverished communities.
