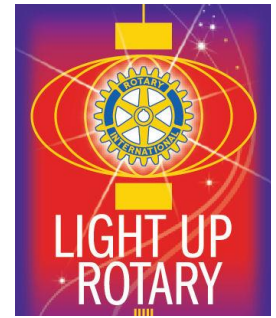

## GREAT NEWS FROM THE CHAMBER EXEC

Mike Linehan kept the luncheon lively with his humor and facts. Yes, the Chamber (450 members) had some CHALLENGES in 2014, but from it, the Chamber's capacity and experience grew. "No one at the Chamber or in the community had a plan to cope with the type of impact generated by the May storms and flooding. What was important was our ability to quickly determine our role in dealing with the giant curve ball thrown at us." Mike and staff handled over 500 calls and 200 text messages...giving answers or making referrals. Eventually, Mike saw the need for media relations, and worked to change the News Channels' message from disaster to recovery. Human interest stories were needed to turn from doom and gloom to "we are responding and recovering."



The Chamber is probably most visible as the Tourism Promotion Agency (TPA) for all of Yates County. It manages a portion of the County's bed tax for a highly effective Public Relations program. 3.2 Billion impressions of Tourism in Yates were generated through a PR agency. "Two minutes of exposure as a Weekend Getaway in a CBS news segment, or 4 mentions on the Today Show are worth much, MUCH more than any advertising that could be purchased." The promotions program is to bring people here to sleep. Attractions such as the wineries or the Windmill can generate day visits, so the Chamber makes the big outreach.

The Chamber assists with the Tourism Grants, where organizations can request funds to assist with events such as festivals or with shows like the Arts Center. The major determinant of funding is: "Will this event bring people to Yates and/or will they stay overnight?"

The Chamber promotes in the region from Connecticut to Mid-New Jersey, across the Northern half of Pennsylvania to Cleveland. They promoted a lot in Ontario, Canada, but recent border issues put a damper on that. There was a slight increase in cross border visits this year. Tourism in the past five years has grown 150%. Job well done.

The Chamber operates an Insurance Program, Electronics Recycling and is the staff and office for the Keuka Wine Trail. Two of the Chamber's more popular online services are "Fish Finder" and FLXLunch.com. In one you find where the fish are biting and in the other you find the DAILY updated lunch menu/specials for all the area restaurants.

## A B C's OF ROTARY

### **What are Rotary Conferences and Assemblies?**

The International Assembly is held each year in January to prepare all of District Governors Elect (like those visiting us this week) from around the world for the office they will assume on 1 July. Accompanied by their spouses, the 525 incoming governors join a host of experienced Rotarian leaders for more than a week of training and motivational sessions. At the assembly they meet the special Rotarian who will serve as RI president during their year as governors and they learn the RI theme for the

coming year around which they will build their home district's conference.

The first International Assembly was held in Chicago, Illinois, U.S.A., in 1919. Later assemblies were held in Lake Placid, New York; Boca Raton, Florida; and Nashville, Tennessee. In recent years the assembly has been held in Anaheim, California. But regardless of the venue, the message on the sign above the plenary hall has remained unchanged for years: "Enter to learn . . . go forth to serve."

**Each District has its own Assembly to prepare club officers to do their jobs well.** In view of the annual turnover of Rotary leadership each year, special effort is required to provide the more than 29,000 club leaders with appropriate instruction for the tasks they will assume. The annual district assembly is the major leadership training event in each Rotary district of the world. **District 7120's 2015 Assembly will be at the Spencerport High School on April 11<sup>th</sup>.**

The district assembly offers motivation, inspiration, Rotary information and new ideas for club officers, directors and key committee chairpersons of each club. Some of the most experienced district leaders conduct informative discussions on all phases of Rotary administration and service projects. The assembly gives all participants valuable new ideas to make their club more effective and interesting. The Penn Yan club usually sends a large contingent of members every year, and all members, regardless of their duties in the club are encouraged to go.

Another important feature of a district assembly is a review by the incoming district governor of the program theme and emphasis of the new RI president for the coming year. District goals and objectives are also described and plans are developed for their implementation. The success of each Rotary club is frequently determined by the club's full representation and participation in the annual district assembly.

**A District Conference is all about fellowship with members and spouses, good fun, inspirational speakers and discussion of matters that make one's Rotary membership more meaningful.** Every person who attends a District Conference finds that being a Rotarian becomes even more rewarding because of the new experiences, insights and acquaintances developed at the conference. Those who attend a conference enjoy going back, year after year.

Everyone of Rotary's more than 525 districts has a conference annually. These meetings are considered so important that the Rotary International president selects a knowledgeable Rotarian as his personal representative to attend and address each conference. The program always includes several outstanding entertainment features, such as the talent show put on by our exchange students, interesting discussions and inspirational programs. One of the added benefits of attending a district conference is the opportunity to become better acquainted with members of one's own club in an informal setting. Lasting friendships grow from the fellowship hour at the district conference.

## DID YOU KNOW?

Rotary's emphasis on **Vocational Service** has its roots in the founding of the organization. The original intent of the young lawyer Paul Harris was to bring together a circle of business and professional acquaintances. And the use of the classification principle...only one member from each profession... the guideline by which nearly all Rotary membership is determined ... assured then and now that each club has among its members a cross-section of a community's business and professional population.

Vocational service is one of the five club Avenues of Service... one of the outlets for every member's commitment to serve. Vocational Service focuses on:

- Adherence to, and promotion of, the highest ethical standards in all occupations, including fair treatment of employers, employees, associates, competitors and the public.
- The recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, not just one's own or those that are pursued by Rotarians.
- The contribution of one's vocational talents to the problems and needs of society.

The purview of Vocational Service is broad; including such activities as mentoring, career days, vocational awards, business assistance, or even talking about one's job at a club meeting.
