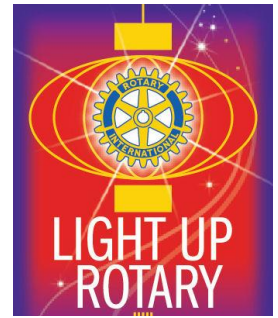

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In Memorial: Stephany Bates



Service Above Self honoree and not yet inducted Rotarian, Stephany Bates died very unexpectedly from an accidental fall at home. The news of her passing was a shock to her several close friends and peers in the Penn Yan Club, across Yates County at her workplace, Pro-Action.

Sue A. and Tom M. close friends of Stephany, were among the several for whom a moment of silence reopened that door to a flood of feelings for their loving friend and her unfortunate death. Truly a sad moment in the club.

Stephany was one of a select few who was most deservedly honored by the club for their service to their employer and the community as a whole. Stephany was person who stepped up, worked long hours and provided a critical service as Penn Yan recovered from the flood of May 2014.

She acted as the clearing house for referrals to various agencies that had goods and services for those families most adversely affected by the flood. waters.

Stephany was employed by Pro-Action of Yates and Steuben and provided a vital service in keeping clients and service providers engaged and informed. In December, she left this assignment in Yates County for career advancement by moving to Pro-Action's headquarters in Bath, New York.

Stephanie had been part of the Pro Action family for nearly 8 years. In Bath, she was the Special Projects Manager where every day she brought passion and dedication to her role of finding ways to serve families and individuals in need. Stephanie lived and breathed the mission of Pro Action and Community Action. She was an amazing member of the Pro Action team, and this will be a difficult time for the agency.

Stephanie has two young sons, a loving husband and parents. She was a dear friend to many of us and words cannot express how much this loss makes our hearts ache. A memorial contribution of \$100 to a new trust fund for her sons was unanimously adopted by the club at lunch. Her sudden departure reminds us all to appreciate every day we have as if it were a gift. Funeral services at the First Baptist Church, Main St., Penn Yan, Thursday 4/23 at 11 AM.

Fellowship at lunch this week

23 made it out for lunch of chef salads and Shepard's Pie. The program, a biography by Sue A. was postponed due to the club's taking time to talk through our grief of Stephany's passing. Terri Sutherland (no relation to any of the Sutherlands in Penn Yan) from Nothnagle Realty visited. Hail and tremendous downpour yesterday had many thinking of last year's inundation and flooding.



Who was this Paul Harris and how did Rotary begin?

According to his biography, Paul Harris was a man of lively spirit, social and adventurous, and often out of step with society. As a boy, he had some troubled time and was once expelled from school for playing pranks. He bounced around New England as good and bad fortune affected his family. After earning his law degree in 1891, he wasn't quite ready to settle down. Instead, he worked his way around the globe for five years as a sailor, a cannery worker, an orange picker, an actor, and a cowboy.

Finally, at 28 years old, he settled into a law practice in bustling Chicago. His practice was successful, but Paul longed for closer male friendship (something he wanted in youth as well). He started meeting with friends as a mutual benefit club, and at a third meeting 15 men attended. They were trying to come up with a name for the new club...The Trade and Talk Club, or the FFF Club...Food, Fun, and Fellowship?

They were going to rotate the meeting place of the club between members, so Paul Harris suggested simply, "How about Rotary Club?"

The Rotary Club adopted only two Objectives in the bylaws in 1906:

1. The promotion of the business interests of its members.
2. The promotion of good fellowship and other desiderata ordinarily incident to social clubs.

But in April – the same month that the Great Earthquake shook in San Francisco – a patent attorney named Donald Carter shook up Rotary. Looking at the bylaws he said, "Such a club has great possibilities if it could do something of some benefit to people besides its own members. I believe it should do civic service of some kind."

In 1907 -- A third Object was added: Advancement of the best interests of Chicago and the spreading of the spirit of civic pride and loyalty among its citizens.

And thus in that year came the first service projects in Rotary history—a public comfort station in downtown Chicago and a new horse for a country preacher.

The Chicago Club rapidly expanded to 140 members and became a registered nonprofit. But Paul Harris saw that more was possible. If Rotary made such a difference in Chicago, why not replicate it in other cities? He then commissioned friends to try and develop Rotary Clubs as they travelled or moved. San Francisco and Oakland followed in '08 and '09. New York City, also in late '09 was the 6th club. Buffalo (our conference site) was the 28th club and Rochester was the 36th club in March '12.

Harris did not serve as the presiding officer of his Chicago club, but in 1910, Harris was elected to two terms as president of the newly formed Association of Rotary Clubs. His life and dreams of a world changing association of men (no women for decades) was complicated and at times difficult. None the less, today Rotary is very influential on the world stage.

Paul Harris died in 1947, age 79, proud of Rotary's role in forming the United Nations (1944-45).
