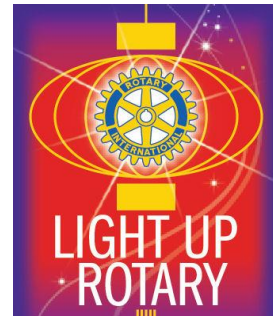

The [Rotary Foundation](#) has partnered with eight leading universities around the world to establish [Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution](#).

Some goals of the Rotary Centers are to advance knowledge of peace and conflict issues and to provide education opportunities to potential future leaders. The Rotary Foundation intends to meet its goals by sending 70 scholars to one of eight universities to earn a master's-level degree in the area of peace and conflict studies. Scholars are fully funded for two years, receiving benefits such as tuition, room, board and other expenses.

The eight universities chosen to host Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution are:

- Duke University and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, North Carolina, USA (both universities jointly host one Rotary Center)
- International Christian University, Tokyo, Japan
- Sciences Po, Paris, France
- Universidad del Salvador, Buenos Aires, Argentina
- University of Bradford, West Yorkshire, England
- University of California-Berkeley, California, USA
- University of Queensland, Brisbane, Australia
