Board Meeting and Assembly

New Member Inductions were one of very few topics to be discussed this month. **Amy Hoffman's** and **Paulina Reed's** applications were previously approved and the required two week club member consideration period has passed without any comments. Four more applications are outstanding and will be considered by the board at their regular meeting of September 8th. If you have plans on inviting someone into Rotary, now is the best time to do it. The Induction is planned for the OCTOBER 13th. The Board hopes to have a nice formal ceremony for this new class.

The Board discussed the need for an updated "strategy" for dealing with requests for donations. In the past, there have been guidelines that assisted the board in considering these requests from individuals (scout projects) and organizations (the Sheriff's Office or the Living Well), to name but a few. The **president, president elect** and **vice president** will meet with **Ef A.** and **Don O.** to develop guidance for board consideration. This policy will affect only those unbudgeted donations and not affect the planned contributions to Boy's State, Girl's State, Interact, Rotaract, etc. The typical amount given each year to these unplanned contributions is generally budgeted for about \$1,000.

Interact is in sore need of an adult leader who will spend a few hours a week guiding the youth leaders, making reports to the Rotary District, and keeping members/parents...

Board continued:

...connected by email. Sandi P will continue as the co-leader at meetings and can provide some historical perspective and support to the new primary leader. The leader can be either a parent or other non-Rotarian, so long as Sandi P. is the secondary leader.

Tom M asked that every member make a point of **paying dues by August 15th**.

Ef A reported that his wife, Susan, will be collecting thirty fishing poles from the Canandaigua Rotary Club this week. It has been a remarkably successful campaign. (She must have inherited genes from a Sorcerer's Apprentice.)

Tom M., Carol W., President Bob, Ef A. Steve M. Dave H. John S. and Rob S. are looking at the fundraising options for '16-'17 (and further), assuming the 50th Auction will be our last. The growing club consensus appears to be that we have grown tired of asking for the donation of auction items. **Send your ideas to one of these people.** One idea being pursued is a micro-brewery festival. Another is a community day celebration, similar to the Firemen's Carnival. Everyone is looking for a way to raise \$10-15,000 but doesn't burn out the club.

Chris B., when the discussion turned to fundraising, asked the board to consider an activity that is more family-oriented and did not involve alcohol. **Diane K.** suggested we consider partnering with some other agency that has a strong pull in the community. Polio eradication and Camp ONSEYAWA don't have big community recognition.

Tom H., Sarah C. and Carol W. have signed on to lead the 50th Rotary Day Auction on March 5th, 2016. **President Bob** was visibly relieved to have leadership in place for his term's critical fundraiser.

Rotary at home in the Land of the Midnight Sun

Rotary came to Finland in 1926. The 1920s in Finland were marked by the building up of the newly established Republic of Finland that had torn itself away from the position as a Grand Duchy under a Governor General of the Russian empire. Finland's moment came in 1917 during the Russian revolution and in the aftermath of WWI. When WWII broke out there were eight clubs in Finland and 270 rotarians.

Cooperation with Germany during the actual fighting of the war and the uneasy peace concluded with the Soviet Union after the war left little leeway. Neither of the two totalitarian countries looked too kindly upon the Anglo-American influenced Rotary. The general trend in the post-war years, when the country sought a closer orientation towards the Western world, brought about a boom in the establishment of Rotary Clubs in all parts of the country. A social order for rotary had emerged. Similar trends in the other Nordic countries took all to the top ten league in Rotary density per capita in the world. Today Finland has a good 300 Rotary clubs and 10.900 Rotarians in a population of 5,4 million.

Finnish Rotary clubs are divided into six Districts, with District 1420 being responsible for the administration of the Rotary clubs in Estonia.

Stacy W gave us a little bit of history: The first Rotary Club was formed when attorney [Paul P. Harris](#) called together a meeting of three business acquaintances in downtown Chicago at Harris's friend Gustave E. Loehr's office in the [Unity Building](#) on Dearborn Street on February 23, 1905.^[5] In addition to Harris and Loehr (a mining engineer and Freemason), Silvester Schiele (a coal merchant), and Hiram E. Shorey (a tailor) were the other two who attended this first meeting. The members chose the name Rotary because initially they rotated subsequent weekly club meetings to each other's offices, although within a year, the Chicago club became so large it became necessary to adopt the now-common practice of a regular meeting place.
